

"The more you shoot, the greater your chance of getting a great picture," says Jordan Rosner, a professional whose Jordan Elyse Photography (jordanelyse.com) does custom photo shoots with families. Of course, vary where you stand and what baby's doing.

Keep shooting.

- To do this right Buy lots of film or extra memory cards (for a digital camera). Make peace with the fact that you'll throw out or delete many pictures. It's no big deal if you have 22 so-so shots if you have two excellent ones.

ways to photograph your toddler

Professional photographer
Jordan Rosner has learned
that when a toddler realizes
that posing for a picture is
important, he's likely to get
shy or act out. It's critical
to make the experience
low-key and fun. Try:

1. A freeze game If your child is active, take him outside and tell him to run around until he hears "freeze!" When he gets close to you, yell "freeze!" and take the picture of him frozen-he'll often be in a

funny pose and laughing.

A camera with automatic focus makes this easier.

2. Let him play

Photograph a child tearing open presents or playing with a new toy. Give up on having him look right at you. Keep him occupied so he forgets you're taking his picture and continue shooting as long

as he's not turned away.
